FAREWELLS TO BRIEL, LUYKX, SCHEEPERS AND MALHERBE

TIME has come for four CDM employees to say their good-byes to Oranjemund. While Messrs Briel and Luykx opted for quieter celebrations with colleagues, friends and family, official farewells were held for Johannes Scheepers and 'Whitey' Malherbe at the Ladies Lounge of the Recreation Club.

Barnie Briel

Barend Johannes Briel, known to everyone as 'Barnie', is retiring after thirty-four years with CDM. When he began his first shift as an overseer in 1951, the rate was 22/3d per shift and Mr C P A Lourens was then the general manager.

Barnie soon made the transition from daily paid employee to treatment plant foreman at the start up of the first heavy media separation plant - No 4 Plant.

He recalls being involved in the interesting French Lavodune pilot scheme where separators were to be placed at various places on the mine, thereby reducing the cost of transporting gravels. Having gained valuable experience on the Lavodune separation unit at Mittag, Barnie was required to stay at the new site at Affenrucken for protracted periods to see the scheme to fruition, returning home only at weekends.

The handling capacity of the Lavodune units proved far too small for CDM's operation and the scheme was abandoned.

The Briel name became synonymous with first aid. Holding a first aid qualification since 1959, Barnie was often 'volunteered' as

a member of first aid competition teams and frequently called upon to judge events. One such occasion was the first ever migrant team's first aid competition held in 1971. Barnie still holds a valid first aid certificate.

Mr George Nisbet, whose retirement as chairman of the Chamber of Mines was announced this week, was the general manager of CDM at that time and held this position until 1973.

Barnie, whose whole career was spent with the Metallurgy Department, was seconded to Training as an instructor/foreman for two years.

In 1972 he was promoted to plant foreman and has since acted as plant superintendent, Recovery, on several occasions.

A high point was reached when Mr Harry Oppenheimer, personally and for the last time in his capacity as chairman, came to Oranjemund to make the 25 year award presentations and Barnie was one of the recipients.

A founder member of both the Camera and Yacht Clubs, nowadays Barnie's interest lies in the garden.

For Barnie, a consistent character who doesn't welcome change, moving from Oranjemund will be quite an upheaval, particularly as he and his wife, 'Miempie' have stayed all their married life at 66-4th Avenue. During his thirty-four years, Barnie has been the only Briel to reside in Oranjemund. Now he plans to live in Parys which not only has other Briel families but also has a Briel Street, named after a cousin who was a mayor of that town.

Ready to welcome the Briels to Parys are several old friends and ex-Oranjemunders - Wenner van Niekerk - a plumbing project foreman who retired 3-4 years ago; Piet van Wyk ex-Parks and Gardens and 'Oosie' Oosthuizen who retired from Oranjemund

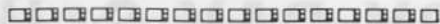

MINE TOURS - ORANJEMUNDERS, PLEASE CO-OPERATE

SINCE the inception of a R2 fee to Oranjemund residents and their guests wishing to participate in the weekly mine tours, the Public Relations Department has experienced countless problems.

One of the reasons that the R2 fee was introduced, apart from generating income to the Community Chest, was to obviate cancellation of reservations without notice. In many instances, large numbers of people were turned away when tours were fully booked. Yet on the morning of the excursion, many seats were left vacant due to 'no shows'.

When the nominal fee was instituted, the Public Relations Department, through the medium of the Newsletter, advertised the procedure to be followed. Since then, through the Mine Tour policy in the Newsletter, the community is kept informed of the booking system employed by the department. Unfortunately, very few people adhere to the basic requirements.

To avoid disappointment, residents are advised to take note of the following:

- ★ The tour leader is not authorised to accept the R2 fee which has to be paid at the Cashier's Office. The monies are donated to the Community Chest for distribution towards charity.
- ★ The receipt must be presented to the typist/clerk in the Public Relations Department by not later than 15h00 on the Thursday preceding the tour - only then will a reservation be deemed confirmed. Passengers who fail to present their receipts, will be considered as having cancelled their seats and as such, their names will not appear on the passenger list which is sent to Personnel Control Centre on the Thursday

afternoon.

Co-operation is also requested with regards the introductory video presentation at the Loss Control Induction Centre. The presentation starts promptly at 07h45. It is therefore suggested that passengers arrive not later than 07h40 to take their seats. Late arrivals cause disruptions. It should also be noted that transport is not provided from the Loss Control Induction Centre to the Personnel Centre. Passengers must make their own arrangements.

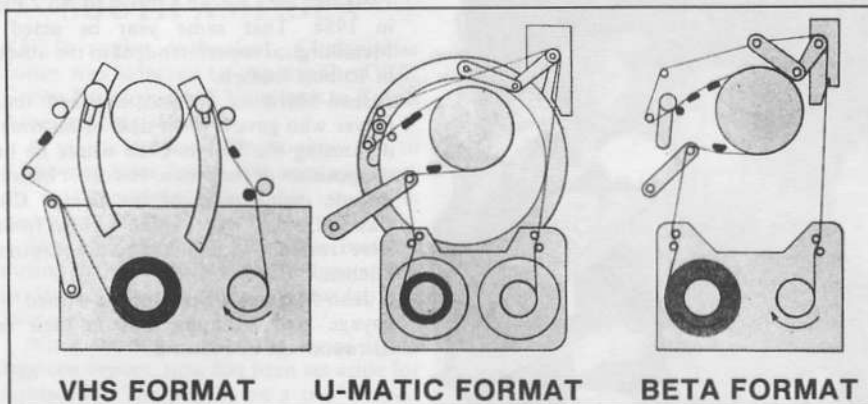

VIDEO - and the System/Format confusion

ARE YOU confused when people talk about the various 'systems' and 'formats' in video recording? Don't feel you are alone! In a recent survey undertaken in the USA, among educators, nearly 80% did not know which format they were using at that time! So - if you are confused, perhaps this will help:

Firstly, cameras, recorders and monitors have to work on the same television 'system', if they are to work at all. There are three systems available in the world. NTSC which is the American system, SECAM, which is the French system and PAL, which is the German system (used in South Africa). (For those with a technical bent, NTSC is National Television Systems Committee, SECAM is Système Couleurs à memoire and PAL is Phase Alternating Line). As you can guess, each system has its own way of getting the picture from the camera to the TV screen (or monitor) and as such are incompatible. This will normally not prove a problem, as the equipment which you buy in South Africa, and which conforms to SABS standards, will be PAL - and so cameras will be compatible with recorders and monitors. There is only one reason for choosing a system other than PAL and that is when you receive tapes in *any* format (discussed later) where the tape has been recorded overseas using either the NTSC or SECAM system. You then need a tape player and monitor that can decode these signals. These are obtainable in the industrial market and on a few domestic brands. They are called 'tri-standard' and a switch on the player and monitor (sometimes automatic) will allow you to choose the system to suit your tape.

Now let us look at FORMATS. If you are about to purchase video equipment, you could be totally confused trying to decide which format to choose. What do we mean by format? Pick up an audio tape (as used in cassette recorders) and you have a tape format called the 'Compact Cassette'. The beauty of this format, pioneered by Philips, is that you can pop it into any compact cassette recorder in the world and it will play. Alas, not so with video recorders. As each of many companies developed video cassette recorders, they designed a format of

tape that would fit only their range of recorders. And there have been many! Sony with its BETA (and U-Matic) formats, JVC with its VHS format (and VHS-C format) *plus* other formats from companies such as Technicolor and no less than three formats from Philips - each one incompatible with the other! Incompatible mainly because of the size of the cassettes, the method of threading the tape and the speed and method of 'writing' the image onto the tape.

But take heart. The only 3 formats you need consider are U-Matic, BETA and VHS. These 3 systems are used world-wide in the training and education fields. (By the way, you can buy and use any FORMAT tape anywhere else in the world provided that you replay the tape on equipment using the same SYSTEM as it was recorded on).

U-MATIC: This format was released by Sony in the early 70s and has become the industry standard for those people wanting to approach professional one inch recording, but want to keep costs down. The tape is three quarter inch wide and the equipment is designed to give high quality production, editing and copying. It's used extensively in universities, production houses and training institutions.

BETA: Also a Sony invention. The Beta format is a smaller version of the U-Matic using half inch tape and specifically designed for the amateur or domestic market. Quality is good but the equipment was designed to give only rudimentary editing facilities and the models change almost weekly to satisfy the public's taste for 'gadgets'. The cameras and recorders do not have the facility to be expanded for studio use where a number of cameras and other equipment have to be 'sync'ed together.

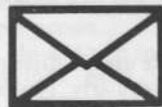
VHS: Launched by JVC only a few months after Sony's Beta format and aimed at the same market, the VHS is very similar to Beta. The cassettes are slightly larger but

also use half inch tape and the recording speed is slightly slower, otherwise all remarks made about the Beta format are true for the VHS format as well.

VHS INDUSTRIAL: We believe that this is the format which will make great inroads into the teaching and training fields in the future. Although the tape is standard VHS format, and can be played (and recorded) on any VHS machine, the industrial equipment has been designed to give all the facilities available on U-Matic, at between half and two thirds of the cost!

IN SUMMARY: When you buy equipment for use in South Africa, choose the P.A.L. system for recording (with multi-standard playback, if you receive tapes from overseas) and choose the format that best suits *your* needs. some twenty years ago. He used to drive the truck which travelled regularly between Oranjemund and Lüderitz.

Johannes Scheepers

Born in Prieska the same year that Barnie Briel began his career with CDM, was Johannes Ferraira Scheepers who also retires, sadly, due to ill health.

Johannes joined the Company in 1971 as a trainee operator, Mining and later that year transferred to Metallurgy. He was made foreman after several periods of acting in that capacity during 1977.

Johannes met and married Johanna who

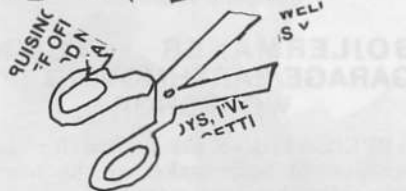

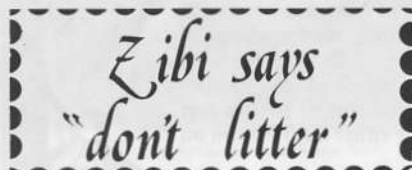
