For plant superintendent, Abner Skwambane Tuesday, 6 June was a memorable day. It was also the day on which he committed the Gemsbok men to renewing their efforts to compete for the trophy again this November.

GM challenges Gemsbok to run the full distance

Three-time winners of the General Manager's six-monthly Good Housekeeping Award, Gemsbok Mine was challenged by Keith Whitelock to finish the year with the style they had started it.

He congratulated representatives of the safety committee led by Abner Skwambane for winning the trophy and for having developed an excellent team spirit despite the size of the area under their control which would equal any other De Beers operation.

Gemsbok includes 4 Treatment Plant, 4 Plant Mining, S800 and SH400 bucket wheels and workshops, Field Services, Apprentice and Driver/Operator Training, 50G workshops, PTF Plant, the dredge, North Hostel and Transport South.

Keith reminded them that Gemsbok has the reputation of starting well but not lasting the pace, and at the same time inviting their commitment to finish the year in the same grand style as it had been begun.

Good housekeeping inspections for the first six months reveal that Gemsbok's 92,34% beat nearest rivals Affenrucken/Mittag by just 2,6%. The area with the lowest disabling injury frequency rate in 1988, Uubvley, poses the greatest threat to their future supremacy. Also close contenders, not to be discounted at this stage, 3 Plant did well with 88,02%.

Speaking about the relationship between good housekeeping and other

safety factors, he said: "Good housekeeping is mostly about people and saving money but it is not an end in itself. It is a means to an end."

"Out of good housekeeping comes cost effective working. Out of good housekeeping comes safety."

He noted that one of six disabling injuries experienced on the mine this year so far had been at Gemsbok - a higher percentage than across the

Arthur Conry jnr chosen to play Craven rugby

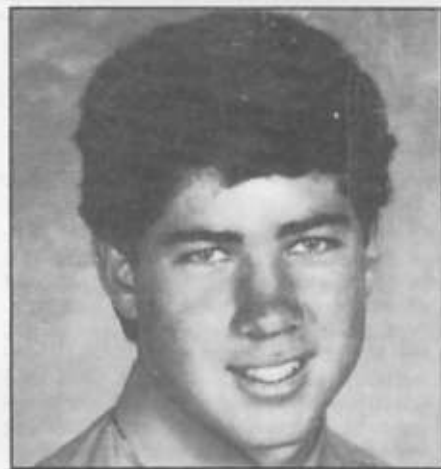
Arthur Conry, 16-year-old pupil of Namaqualand High School and an all-rounder on the sportsfield has been selected to play for the high schools' Craven Week.

Victor's triumph recognised at Projects

Last week Victor Slinger was presented with a certificate on having successfully completed the Major Learner Draughtsman course by chief draughtsman, Richard Duncleley. Not an outstanding event you might think, but this award represented a significant achievement and personal triumph for Victor whose career prospects had been shattered in a devastating vehicle accident 2 1/2 years ago.

As a recently qualified CDM apprentice, Victor's life was radically changed on the road between Keetmanshoop and Mariental. He underwent major surgery and spent six months in hospital, his future, viewed from a wheelchair, looked bleak.

Victor's unenviable position - married with two children - was recognised by Mike Benade who knew him as an apprentice. Mike recommended him for the two-year De Beers Major Learner Draughtsman Scheme. His technical background, a trade certificate and N4 qualification equipped Victor for the demanding course, the first year of which was held in Kimberley.

When the course at Kimberley closed down Victor returned to CDM to continue studying under Dodge Benjamin.

Victor expressed his gratitude for the considerable support he got from friends and colleagues at Projects, many of whom are contractors.

"Determination and God's help are what got me through," said Victor who plans a further 4-5 years of study to become a design draughtsman.

Town Pool again closed for repairs

Closed for some time now, the town swimming pool will undergo major repairs in the near future. Mr Ron Whiteley, section engineer Township, says that this will be a huge task. Apart from structural repairs, all the piping has to be replaced and the pool must be relined.

A number of problems have beset the pool over the past few years. Roots of large trees which caused severe damage to the west side of the pool, were all cut out. These roots have caused further damage and leaks in the piping, an existing problem.

A contractor from Cape Town has been called in to assess the problem and has given a quote for the repairs. The Company has accepted the quote. According to Ron Whiteley, a completion date can unfortunately not be announced until he has more information from the contractor.

Mr Whiteley says further: "We hope it will be worth waiting for the job to be well done by professionals. We are also planning to improve the pool surroundings at the same time."

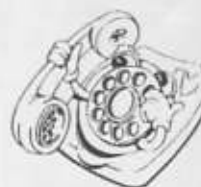

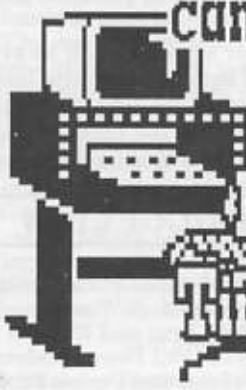
