CDM WINS SILVER AT CHAMBER SOCCER

The match started off at a fast and furious pace with both teams looking very evenly matched. The CDM defence, much under the control of centre half Phil Laubscher played brilliantly and kept the opposing team's attackers at bay. Both teams had equal opportunities to score but the half-time whistle blew with no changes to the scoreboards.

Soon after the start of the second half, the fast TCL left wing initiated a superb attack and opened TCL's score (1 goal to nil). This did not seem to perturb the maroon-kitted CDM players who continued their fine display of good ball control and distribution. However, it was again the fast breakthrough of the TCL forwards who increased their score by a further goal 13 minutes later. This eventually ended as the final score for the day.

In general, the CDM teams played well in all their week-end matches despite the unfavourable weather conditions. Both Saturday and Sunday's games were played in gale force east wind conditions, which to a large extent, hampered the standard of football.

Sunday's cup final was followed by the presentation of medals to the winning teams and runners-up by the Chamber of Mines Vice-President and Managing Director of Rössing, Mr Colin Macaulay.

All participants in the tournament enjoyed a well-organized braai and refreshments at the Arandis Recreation Club.

THREE CDM teams plus seven officials left for Swakopmund last Friday morning to participate in the seventh South West African/ Namibian Inter-Mine soccer tournament held at the Rössing Country Club.

CDM B played their first game against Uis mine on Friday at 17h30. Uis, although playing fast, aggressive football, were outplayed by the faster CDM forwards and eventually lost by 6 goals to 1. CDM's goals were scored by Keith Hutton (penalty), Isak Rooi and Bradley Quinton (four goals).

In the following match in the A division, CDM A1 played their counterparts CDM A2, beating them by 6 goals to nil. The CDM A1 side then had a bye and went straight through to the A division cup finals.

On Saturday morning CDM A2 played Rössing A2 at 11h00. CDM were unfortunate in losing Chris Jones, their goalkeeper with an injury in the early half of the match, after leading by one goal to nil. Twenty minutes into the second half, Rössing scored the equalizer from a corner and soon afterwards increased their score to 2 goals to 1. In the dying minutes of extra injury time Rössing sealed their victory by making the final score 3 goals to 1. CDM A2's goal was scored by Jackie Clark.

In the early afternoon match CDM B played TCL B. In the closing minutes of the first half Manuel Kaheka opened the score for CDM after receiving a brilliant pass from right winger Isak Rooi. The CDM defence, however, playing very erratic football, allowed TCL B to score two quick

goals midway in the second half. Ten minutes before the match ended TCL were again rewarded with a fine goal making the final score TCL B - 3 CDM B - 1.

Early on Sunday morning the sportsmen travelled to Arandis where both the A and B division cup finals were played.

In the first match TCL B beat Otjihase B by 6 goals to 1. At 10h00 TCL A1 and CDM A1 entered the field for the highlight of the week-end - the A division cup final.

AMENDED HOUSING POLICY

WITH effect from 20 June 1986 the housing policy has been amended.

General Transfers

Married employees who have occupied their present house for at least five years will qualify to transfer from one house to another (in the same category) only once during any period of employment and only empty houses at the time of application will be available for transfer.

Such houses will be based on total points accumulated (basic plus service points) as per the points system listed below.

In the case of houses that have not yet been maintained, the senior community services officer - Township, together with the Town Building Maintenance foreman, will consult with the applicant on maintenance to be carried out.

Points System

Basic points allocated for various gradings:-

Senior Official Houses: D4-72 points; D3 - 36 points and D2 - 0 points.

Staff Houses: D1 - 36 points and C4 - 0 points.

Standard Houses: C3 - 108 points; C2 - 72 points; C1 - 36 points and B4 - 0 points.

On promotion an individual will lose his basic points but retain service points which are to be added to the basic points at the new grade.

Service Points

Service points are accumulated at the rate of one point for each month of continuous CDM service calculated from the date of employment on a permanent basis.

MINE TOURS

1. Bookings on mine tours will only be confirmed on receipt of the R2 donation. Monies should be paid to the cashier, Accounts Department and the receipt then presented to the typist/clerk in the Public Relations Department by not later than 15h00 on the Thursday preceding the tour.
2. The mine tour will commence at the Loss Control Induction Centre where an introductory video presentation will be screened. Passengers are requested to gather at the Centre by not later than 07h40.
3. From the Induction Centre passengers will be required to provide their own transport to the Personnel Control Centre from where the mine tour proper will commence at 08h15.
4. Children under the age of 14 and pregnant women are not permitted to accompany mine tours as health regulations stipulate that they should not be exposed to X-ray radiation except for medical reasons. Wheelchair patients will not be permitted to accompany mine tours.
5. Visitors should remove films from their cameras when they exit through the Personnel Control Centre in order to avert exposure or X-ray damage. With battery operated equipment such as photographic flashlights, calculators etc. the batteries will have to be removed and are forfeit by the owner. In terms of security regulations it is necessary to hand in other hand luggage for inspection prior to departure from the mining area.

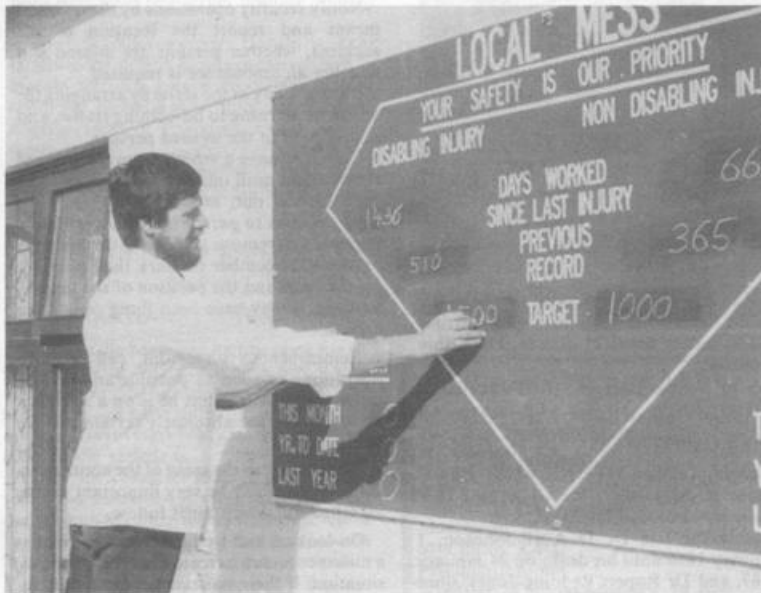

FIVE MINUTE SAFETY TALK

What to do after an accident

AT AN underground mine a worker noticed a man lying on the ground behind a barricade to a disused area of the mine. Thinking that the person might be injured, he rushed in to lend assistance and was promptly overcome by dangerous gas which was present in the area. The result - two persons dead.

The example given illustrates the point that however keen you are to lend assistance to an unfortunate accident victim, you must firstly consider the safety of yourself and of all the other helpers who might be needed.

The rules to follow when you are the first person on the scene of an accident, or when an accident is reported to you, are largely based on common sense.

When you are the first person on the scene of an accident:

- Establish the safety of the area. Call for help, call for a first-aid box and allocate someone to call security operations and advise them of the accident, the number of persons involved and whether an ambulance is required.

- Render first aid treatment to the patient by arresting serious bleeding immediately and treating him according to first aid principles.

- Stay with the injured person and reassure him continually. An injured person is in a state of shock and your reassurance is vitally important to him.

When an accident is reported to you:

- Go immediately to the scene of the accident, taking a first-aid box with you.

- At the scene of the accident render assistance to the injured person as described above.

At the scene of a vehicle accident:

- Notify security operations by the quickest means and report the location of the accident, whether persons are injured and whether an ambulance is required.

- Ensure safety at the scene by arranging for adequate warning to on-coming traffic, and render help to the injured persons.

- Do not remove a vehicle from the scene of the accident until initial investigations have been carried out, especially if there have been injuries to persons. If it is absolutely necessary to remove vehicles in the interests of safety, remember to mark their position on the road and the position of the injured persons, if they have been flung out of the vehicle.

Remember to stay calm, call security operations as soon as possible and do not move the patient unless he is on a stretcher or unless you are absolutely certain that he can walk.

Do not disturb the scene of the accident as the least clue may be very important to the investigation which must follow.

On-lookers and bystanders are normally a nuisance and can create a more hazardous situation. If their assistance is not required, and their initial curiosity has been satisfied, move them off and clear the area.

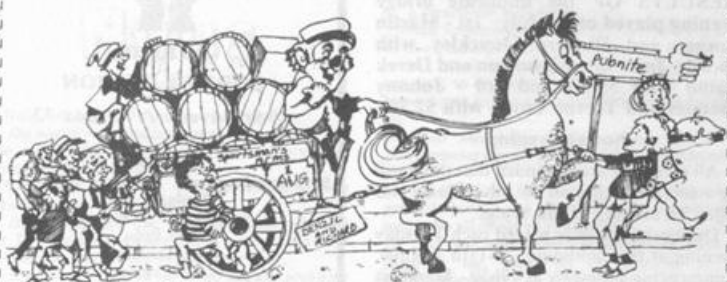

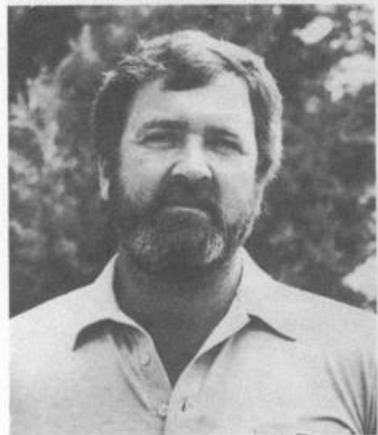

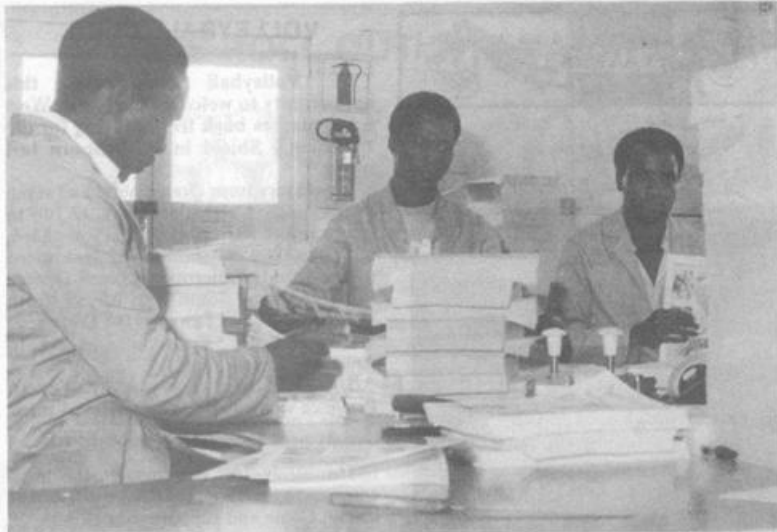
