Golden Boy Baffrath Brings Home a Slice

CDM athletes did bring home a slice of the bacon from Saturday's 10th Chamber of Mines meeting in Windhoek.

Extremely hot weather with little wind created excellent conditions for athletics. The nimbus clouds and lightning that threatened to mar the day eventually moved away later in the afternoon.

There was no denying Rössing's overall supremacy and CDM did well to come second only 14 points behind in the A Division. The diamond miners were third in the B Division.

Hero of the meeting was CDM's up-and-coming athlete Des Baffrath who won every race he entered. Gold medals in the 400, 800 and 1 500 metre races gained him the Victor Ludorum trophy (B Division). This talented 22-year-old displayed the

1989 Sperrgebiet Golf Championships

- A Roaring Success

Last weekend, Oranjemund was again inundated with 95 visiting golfers for the 13th Annual Sperrgebiet Amateur Golf Championships.

Arriving on Friday from as far afield as Gobabis, Uis, Swakopmund, Cape Town and Johannesburg, the visitors were greeted, to their dismay by a typical Oranjemund summer wind during their practise round. No doubt, many of the first time visitors were wondering what they had let themselves in for.

However, Saturday dawned bright and sunny, changing to light overcast a bit later. Luckily, the "feared" wind did not materialize and the tournament got off to a perfect start.

Pre-tournament favourites Page, Parr, Wolhunter and Boesch all put together very good first round scores, in fact the best first round scores recorded in a Sperrgebiet for a long time of 75, 76, 77 and 77 respectively. With the low scoring and good golf being played, the stage was set for an exciting tussle.

Unfortunately the difficult course and fatigue started to take its toll, and only one player, Tony Davidson from Westlake Golf Club, was able to break eighty with a second round 76. Page, Parr, Wolhunter and Boesch all had identical rounds of 82. This slump cost these four players dearly and suddenly Tony Davidson, who was 6 shots behind after the first round, found himself co-leader with Mike Page. One shot back was Chris Parr and two shots behind were Wolhunter and Boesch.

With the scores so close going in to the final round on Sunday, the nervous tension mounted with Parr, Boesch and Wolhunter regularly dropping shots on the front nine. Davidson and Page however, were playing steady golf and an exciting tussle ensued, keeping both the gallery

When a landmark of historic tradition becomes the scene of a shocking murder, a military commander and a street-tough cop are forced into action. Sean Connery and Mark Harman star in the **The Presidio**, this weekend's action movie with a 2-16 age restriction.

Also a cop movie **Manhunter**, is Monday and Tuesday's presentation, described as an above-average thriller with lots of twists.

The screenplay is based on Thomas Harris's best selling novel **Red Dragon** by

the Emmy award winning producer of **Miami Vice**, Michael Mann.

Why this incredibly exciting book has taken so long to be made into a movie is itself a mystery. Notwithstanding this Mann has done a first rate job with the excellent story.

William Petersen has the role of the unusually gifted forensics specialist Will Graham who is persuaded to rejoin the FBI to track down a psychotic killer of families.

Graham is reluctant to get involved at first because on a previous case he became too emotionally involved and suffered a nervous breakdown. However, the killer forces his involvement by threatening his family. This movie has several gory scenes which earned it a 2-18 age restriction.

For a total change of pace and a lighter mood see **License to Drive** next weekend.

Being under the legal age to drive (it's 16 in the States) doesn't deter a fifteen year-old Romeo, played by Corey Haim. He tries to win the girl of his dreams with his grandfather's swanky car.

Not new to the film industry blue-eyed Corey has appeared in **Murphy's Romance**, **The Lost Boys**, **Silver Bullet**, **Dream a Little Dream** and **Watchers**. Not bad for an 18 year-old.

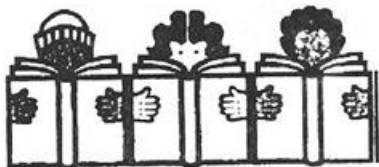

mettle that has won him the SWAAU and SAAU under 21, 800 metre titles.

A long-standing rivalry between Daniel Muhuura (Rössing) and Martin Dandu, this year saw Dandu get the upper hand.

In the 400m (A Division) race, both athletes bettered the 1988 Chamber record. However, it is Dandu who set the new mark at 47,5.

Edward Jaepa ran a storm in the 100m, 10,7 seconds being good enough for a gold medal.

There was disappointment in store for Joe Absai and team-mate Lazarus Kapolo who bent the knee to Muhuura in the 800m race and Rössing star Frank Kayele in the 1 500m event. Their stratagem failed to have the required effect and they came second and third by the smallest margins.

There appears to be no-one capable of matching Immanuel Lungameni who dominated the javelin throw for the fourth successive year. His first three throws beat last year's Chamber record which he himself established. The best, 54,44 metres was an incredible 3,28 metre improvement on the 1988 mark.

A Division triple jumper, Martin Tjipita leaped 14,13 metres for gold and long jumped 6,97 metres for a silver medal.

In the Veteran's Division, Sam Cloete threw the discus 32,37 metres for a first place and Chris du Plooy used his shotput experience to claim gold with a 11,4 metre heave.

Both Sam and Chris had to settle for silver last year.

The problems encountered changing batons appear to have been overcome by runners in the A Division, 4 X 100 metre relay event. Dandu, Herbert Wantenaar, Abraham Kahekopo and Ernst Gawanab brought spectators to their feet as Gawanab charged down the straight to finish in first position.

Obituary

John MacPherson

The news of the sudden death of John MacPherson came as a shock, reaching the mine on Friday. Just six weeks after his retirement John was admitted to a hospital in the Cape where he died two days later.

Mac, as he was known, worked on the Company's fields for nearly fifteen years and had a long association with the Riding Club.

Sincere condolences are extended to his widow Barbara and son Christopher.

Certain aspects of the pension fund which appear to discriminate against husbands were discussed at length. Women with young families voiced concerns about maternity leave and sick leave while apparent discriminatory practises against women workers in the lower B-band was a main talking point. Poor Start To Chairman's Safety Shield Competition

The DIFR for the month is 1,32 with the progressive figure being 1,72. The key loss control objective this year is to attain an injury frequency rate of 1,1.

Special loss control projects originally published in the Newsletter on 10 February are repeated. These are Safety in Driving; to make staff aware of the hazards associated with all alcohol abuse, to maintain the audiometric programme; promote off the job safety; discourage littering and to encourage, implement and reward accepted suggestions.

At the caucus of newly elected Residents Council representatives, Keith Brooke, Cherry Burchell, Cathy Buggs, Chris Fourie, Lionel Benjamin, Vanessa Line, Ivan Morrow, Bob Ellis and Chrissie Wiese, elected Fe Webster as their chairperson. The first meeting between management and the Resident's Council is scheduled for Friday, 17 March when problems that Council members have not been able to resolve will be brought before management.

It is likely that among these will be the old rub-veterinary care for pets.

A full report of the proceedings will appear in the Newsletter.

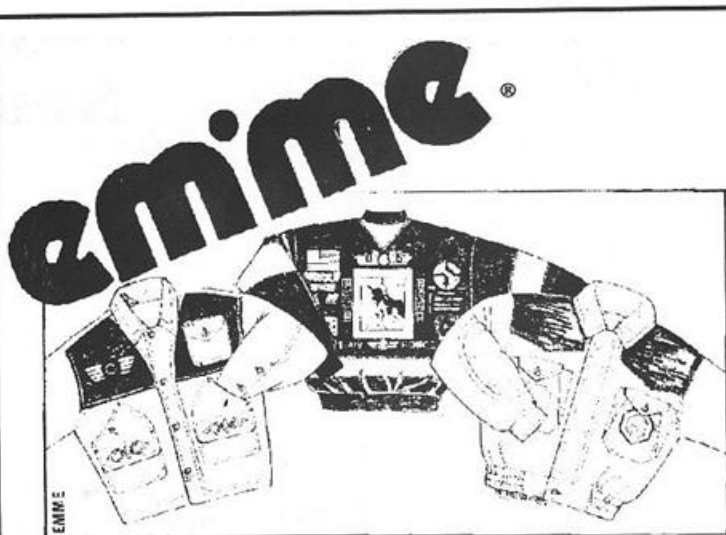

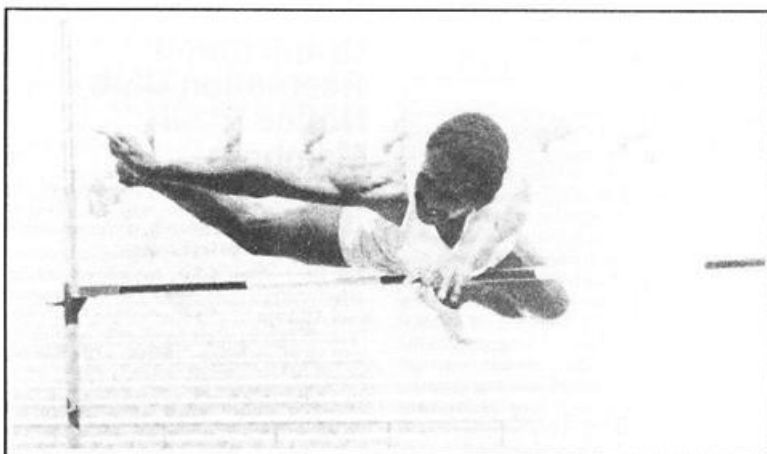

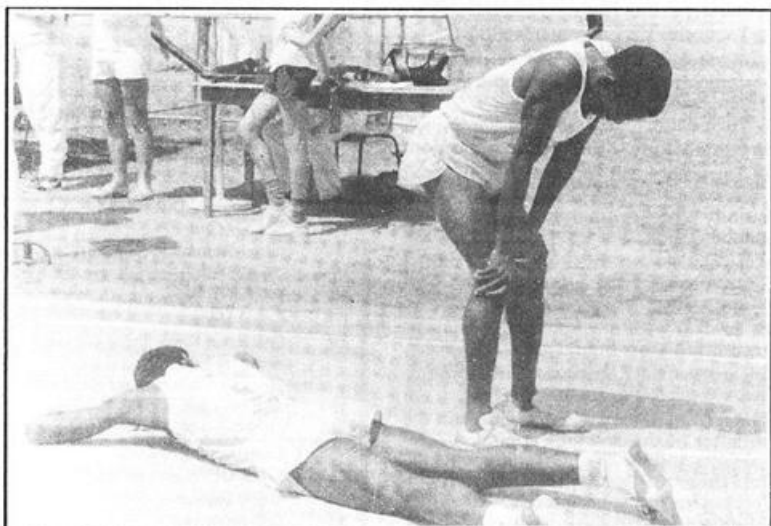
