1991 IN REVIEW

In the recent history of CDM it was the first time ever that the mine closed its production for a week over Christmas. This well deserved break was the result of mining area number one achieving its carat call for the year well in advance.

All plants in mining area number one performed satisfactorily and there were noticeable improvements at the satellite mines.

The year started with Chameis screening plant coming on stream on January 2. The screened product of

Auchas celebrated its first anniversary in June. The plant went to work as planned despite initial teething problems.

Elizabeth Bay Plant was officially opened by the President of Namibia Dr Sam Nujoma on August 2. The opening function was attended by a number of De Beers Centenary and CDM officials, members of the diplomatic corps and government Ministers.

The highest tonnage ever treated by any of CDM's plants was 446 863

per month. The advanced technology available is utilised in the protection of the company product, ranging from low light level observation equipment, radar, thermal imaging equipment and movement sensitive closed circuit television.

The old Duvvley security checkpoint was relocated to Swartkops complex in September where both security and the Immigration section of the Ministry of Home Affairs is accommodated.

In October 2 Plant narrowly missed by 1321 carats, the all time record set by Number 1 Plant in May 1978. With this achievement the plant broke its own previous record set during April 1979 by 10 859 carats.

The mine also received high level government delegations during the year. In June the Minister of Home Affairs Mr Hifikepunye Pohamba visited Oranjemund accompanied by his Permanent Secretary, Mr Ndali Kamati, the Deputy Minister of Labour and Manpower Development, Hadino Hishongwa and Permanent Secretaries of the Ministries of Mines and Energy and Trade and Industry.

The Ministry spoke out on diamond theft, employment of expatriates and hostel conditions. A working committee was set up between the Government, the Company and MUN to combat diamond theft.

The Deputy Minister of Health and Social Welfare, Dr Iyambo Indongo officially opened the new spacious wing at the local hospital in September. The new wing accommodates 36 patients.

On the safety side the bucketwheel workshop at 50G was awarded a four diamond status after a Loss Control reassessment.

During the annual Nosa grading held in October mining area number one retained its five star status. Auchas and Elizabeth Bay which were separately graded received three and two-star gradings respectively.

On the sporting front Oranjemund hosted the Sperrgebiet Golf Challenge over Easter weekend in which

Chameis was treated by 2 Plant and contributed greatly to carat production of the latter - the initial projection was 75 000 carats for 1991.

Number 2 Plant set up two new production records in June. The May tonnage for a 24 shift month was broken and a new record for a 25 shift month was also established. The plant managed to exceed the 400 000 tons barrier for a 25 shift month for the first time in its 16 year operation.

tons by 4 Plant back in 1987. Number 3 Plant however bettered this at 450 123 tons in August.

The 42U screening plant was also reopened and commissioned at the end of September. The plant contributed to diamond recovery in the 3 Plant area.

Ten search facilities were introduced at PCC of which nine were equipped with microdose X-ray machines which cater for 38 000 people on average, who pass through PCC

For the children's sake

We all know that there are advantages of TV but few are willing to be challenged by the disadvantages.

TV controls much of our daily living - how we talk, what we wear, what we eat, what we play and what we read.

Children need to be taught how to cope with TV - they must control it, not it them.

In 1980, the California Education Department conducted tests with half a million 11-17 year olds. The results showed that the more time a child spent watching TV, the lower his achievement scores in reading, writing and mathematics. This had nothing to do with the child's IQ, social background or study practices.

Disadvantages of TV

- TV programmes are broken into segments of 8 minutes or less. This encourages children to have a short attention span. Reading allows time for pondering, and for scrutiny. Passages can be re-read. This cannot happen with TV.
- TV is anti-social. It can be done entirely alone.
- TV deprives the child of one of his most powerful tools - questions.
- It makes use of the common and popular street language. This does not encourage discriminating use of language, nor does it allow for language growth.
- There is little or no family conversation. Everyone is too busy listening to the programme, scared of missing a word, that no-one speaks. It would be better if programmes were discussed, or ideas were talked about, but they are not.

- TV is all pictures. It's like a comic book without even the added caption or two.
- TV cannot show the process of thinking. What may seem a logical development to an adult watching, may seem illogical to a child, and may even encourage irrational behaviour.
- TV encourages deceptive thinking. There are instant solutions to any problem.
- It has negative effect on children's vital knowledge after the age of ten.
- TV stifles the imagination. Nothing is left to the imagination - everything is shown, often in the most graphic detail.
- TV desensitises the child to violence and suffering.
- It is a passive past-time. It discourages creative play. Children often resort to solving problems the TV way.
- TV is addictive. It is like a drug - the more you get, the more you need.
- It will bring about an end to childhood. Too many children are introduced to violence, sex, abuse too early, and see and hear things they should know nothing about. "It is the sense of family, the sense of history, the sense of culture that is being robbed by the flickering blue light of TV. Its overwhelming presence encourages our society to speak less, feel less and imagine less."

The Company retained the Nosa five star grading for the thirteenth year and welcomes both Auchas and Elizabeth Bay to the star graded areas - three and two respectively. Gawie says both Auchas and Elizabeth Bay show potential to improve during the next star grading. He called on everyone to commit themselves to the safety and well being of other fellow workers.

Take care - you have only one life to live. ♦

The Veggie Patch

The vegetable seedlings should be growing well and now is the time to thin out the weaker plants. Be ruthless! Don't waste space, time and effort on a weak plant that will not give you a good crop. If carrots have been planted too close, thin these out to about one centimetre apart. A later thinning can be done when the carrots can be eaten as "baby carrots".

Weeds must be removed as they use up the food intended for the vegetables.

Spinach and tomato plants should get mulch of manure. This will keep the roots cool and moist and help make the crop sweeter.

Tomato plants can be staked to keep the fruit off the ground. Be careful not to damage the stem when tying the plant to the stake.

Trim off any side shoots for bigger fruit, and remove leaves that have yellowed.

The lettuce seedlings can be transplanted between the beans and baby marrow, also using the handspan width (20cm) as a guide.

Take as much soil around the roots as possible to prevent transplant shock to the plant. Mulch with a little compost around each seedling.

The whole veggie patch can do with a sprinkling of Slow Release Nitrogen and Superphosphate watered in well. With the wind that we have been experiencing, and now the heat, it is well to give a very good soaking every evening. Watering in the middle of the day causes leaf burn, especially on lettuce. ♦

ACCIDENT BAROMETER

A total of 216 vehicle accidents were reported and investigated last year. The accidents accounted to nearly a loss of R1m. Vehicle accidents unfortunately spiralled and showed an increase over the previous year.

The type of accidents recorded clearly indicates that most of them should never have happened Reversing 52, vehicles overturned 37, vehicles collided with roadsigns, walls, lamp posts, gates, fences etc. 36, vehicle failing to stop at stopsigns 12, animals 25, collision from rear, side swiped or head on 11, accidents with stationary vehicles 19, U-turns in front of on coming vehicles 2, driving over boulders 4, vehicles which rolled forward or backwards 12 and vehicles which left the road 6.

By using vehicles negligently or recklessly you not only jeopardise your own life but also the lives of either your passengers or innocent bystanders Let us remember to "Drive to arrive alive" during 1992.

Are we really proud of our poor accident record? Let's not make the same mistakes in the new year. ♦
