## CDM LOADING AND HAULING COMPETITION

### SUPERB SCORES

A cold, south wind greeted the six best haul truck drivers and three best front-end loader operators to the finals of the first ever loading and hauling competition on Wednesday morning, 26 July.

Those nine top-competitors reached the finals between 10 - 15 July when nine front end-loader operators and six haul truck drivers were eliminated during the semi-finals. Every month, from June 1989 to May 1990, a winner of the month in the haul truck and front end-loader categories were selected.

Competition, even during the preliminary stages, was keen and the judges were nearly tried in coming up with the monthly winners. Excellent scores were achieved in the early and semi-final stages which boded well for an exciting final.

No 2 Plant's Simon Hamare and Jacob Shingo were two of the front-end-loader finalists with Absolon Pasha of 3 Plant completing the triovincite. Five of the semi-finalists hailed from 3 Plant, three represented No 4 Plant, three came from No 2 Plant and sampling had one operator reach this stage of the competition. Haul truck drivers were evenly distributed through the three mining areas with four qualifications each. Winning through to the finals were three drivers, Julius Mabeke, Joseph Kaljo and Mbuli Kawango Wananga from No 2 Plant; Kamati Ntshali from 3 Plant and Likadi Mabeke and Elrain Iyamba the 4 Plant men.

Scoring sheets for loaders and trucks followed a similar pattern with 10% being allocated for the prestart check, 18% for the starting procedure and 5% for the correct motor reading. Thirty percent was awarded for production - haul cycle time in the case of trucks while load cycle time (LCT) and loads volume (LV) applied to the loaders. Technique covered positioning, manoeuvring, observation of road signs) was also worth 30% with shut-down procedures gaining 10% and general questions the balance - 5%. The general driving evaluation could be said to mean 7% Overall score.

After intense competition, the eventual winners of the two sections were Jacob Shingo, 2 Plant front end loader oper-

ator who scored a magnificent 96%. Equally meritorious was the 95% achieved by 789 haul truck driver Elrain Iyamba of No 4 Plant. Elrain Iyamba stamped his authority on this section of the competition with a high-riding performance in Cat 789 No 8L, also called Whiteback. This machine is recognised as being of particularly mean temperament unlike its popular nickname.

Final results: 789 Haul truck drivers first - Elrain Iyamba 95%, second - Likadi Mabeke 95% and third - Kamati Ntshali 89%.

958 Front end loader operators: first - Jacob Shingo 96%, second - Simon Hamare 95% and third - Absolon Pasha 84%.

**Free rabies inoculations**

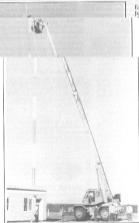
A clinic to inoculate household pets against rabies will be held at the animal clinic on Friday, 11 August between 10:00 and 16:15. There is no charge.
