Signing puts O-Net on the Air



A historic moment as Keith Whitelock for CDM and Piet Venter for SWABC sign the agreement which enables Oranjemunders to receive SWABC programmes.

Signing of the agreement between CDM and SWABC on Tuesday concluded searching negotiations and enables SWABC programmes to be transmitted locally.

Keith Whitelock and the Director General of SWABC, Piet Venter exchanged pens after the signing ceremony which was video recorded and broadcast on SWABC News on Wednesday night.

This is the first joint project of the kind undertaken by SWABC. It was piloted at CDM by Carl Vorwerk, chief technician of radio workshop who supervised and managed this undertaking from its inception.

The first programmes were broadcast on Wednesday evening, 23 August and will continue on a daily basis beginning at 1900 from Monday - Saturday and 1600 on Sunday. Programme schedules provided by SWABC will be published each week in the Newsletter.

At present the transmissions will not reach Unley and Hitting and to rectify this a repeater station will be built at Biesberg on the main, which should be completed by the middle of September.

For years Oranjemund residents have been paying licence fees to SWABC, none

Further negotiations are underway to acquire rights to show video movies with the aid of SWABC to save time hours.

What is Occupational Stress?

For many of us "occupational stress" flashes images of over-committed executives suffering from high blood pressure and/or ulcers, having to watch their food intake and following strict exercise programmes to avoid coronary heart disease and other disorders.

This is only one side of a many faceted issue however, and as early as 1938 Yerkes and Dodson proposed that behavioural efficiency is at an intermediate arousal level. It follows that underload as well as overload could have a stressful effect. For chronic, unmitigated, individual, typically thorough occupational exposure to their personality is being tested and tested.

For many years an emphasis has been placed on cerebral stress management which includes relaxation exercises, physical exercise, diet, etc. More recently the focus of some researchers has moved off this pathology orientated view.

These researchers are interested in the factors which lead themselves to maintaining the optimal level of arousal, similar to that mentioned earlier.

To look only at the magnitude of work is simplistic, and these researchers are involved in identifying stressors, how can

they be managed/controlled, and how individuals deal with them.

Occupational stress is not only limited to executives who have some freedom in organizing stressors in their occupational environment. In contrast to this, moving down the corporate ladder we find people who are subjected to different stressors who deal with them in different ways.

The question is "How can one learn to live, and live well, with stressors and possibly even turn their existence to one's advantage" (Antonovsky 1984).

Obviously this has important implications for individuals in managing their lives, as well as for corporate executives in planning and organizing work hours. This is the first of a series of articles on the subject of "Occupational Stress".

Anton Thanks His Lucky Stars For Danie's Talents.

Danie Thomsen is a man of many talents, not the least being his single figure golf handicap. But Danie is probably better known for the beautiful trophies he makes, a lot of them from the most unlikely pieces of scrap material.

His latest, and no doubt greatest effort, is an astrolobe or star globe (defined by the Oxford Dictionary as "an instrument for measuring altitudes of stars").

Chief surveyor, Anton Muller commissioned the astrolobe which he says: "Despite it's usefulness, this instrument is virtually unobtainable on the market."

Anton borrowed one from Group Survey for Charlotte as a model and in July last year, Danie commenced building. He collected brass from old pump bushes and used a fish net buoy for the globe.

The globe is mounted on a brass meridian circle on pins which represent the polar axis. The circle is divided from 0-90 degrees into four quadrants, the cross being at the pins or poles. The meridian circle is held in place with regard to the horizon circle by two slots in which it can be turned for the purpose of adjusting the latitude.

The horizon circle, in which the meridian circle is mounted, is supported on a platform in a box and also carries four vertical quadrants mounted on a horizontal circle. This system of vertical arcs constructed from brass can be tilted out for

convenient to adjust the globe. Danie drilled the globe and engraved the brass rings with the necessary scalings indicating latitude, Right of Ascension, altitude, azimuth, declination and finally the ecliptic which is divided into 360 degrees. Only the fixed stars are shown on the globe. It is not possible to mark precisely the positions of the sun and planets owing to their motion round the celestial sphere.

The astrolobe has many uses to find approximate solutions to various celestial navigation problems. It enables the navigator, in a few seconds without logarithmic calculations or inspection of tables other than the Nautical Almanac, to determine what altitude any heavenly body has at a particular position and so to find the body by sweeping with an sextant. In this way, the navigator can get nights of evening twilight long before the stars come out and the horizon darkens.

Apart from the meticulously made box which Danie fashioned from wood, he also made the brass latches and hinges and a special container for the compass. A remarkable piece of craftsmanship which it is difficult to believe is actually "homemade".
