## Sports Awards was anything but dry

A 'dry' start to the 1990 Sports Awards evening was not the only difference for 300 guests at the premier sporting function who had to wait until the final presentations before the bars opened.

All-rounder, Lionel Benjamin clinched the coveted Sportsman of the Year title for his cricketing prowess and contribution to sport among Oranjemund's children. Sportswoman of the Year, popular Corrie du Plooy put volleyball firmly on the map.

Guest speaker, Minister of Local Government and Housing, Dr Libertine Amathila made history by being the first woman to address the predominantly male gathering.

Vivacious Dr Amathila, a champion of women's causes who had earlier met a contingent of Oranjemund women, raised a chuckle by saying, "We did not conspire against you".

She spoke of the need to encourage participation in sport by children for its mental as well as physical stimulation and character building. She cited her visit to Japan where she saw industrious workers

jogging and doing exercises during their lunch hour in the street and parks.

She commended Oranjemund sportsmen and women who are prepared to travel long distances to compete in Windhoek and elsewhere in the country. She said that since independence numerous doors have opened for international sporting opportunities, not least for the cream of Namibia's athletes who will have a once-in-a-lifetime chance to compete in the forthcoming Olympic Games.

Bewailing the lack of facilities for joggers in Windhoek, she amused her audience with anecdotes about her attempts to keep fit. Being chased by dogs eventually drove her to doing circuits of her house. "A rather boring venue", she complained.

A maiden speech by a nervous new chairman of the Sports Awards Committee, Koos van der Merwe, was well received. People rose to their feet to acknowledge Hennie de Witt's long years of service to sport as he received a special commemorative shield.

Trevor Troup was acclaimed Administrator of the Year while the vibrant Golf Club made it three-in-a-row as Club of the Year. ♦

## Pedestrian crossings - a grey area

Use a little courtesy", says Israel Kalenga

Who has the right of way at a pedestrian crossing, the motorist of the pedestrian? Although many people are confused about the proper procedure at crossings, a little common sense will clear up this grey area.

When pedestrians and motorists share a section of the road as with crossings, mutual respect is all that is needed. Pedestrians



may not enter the crossing unless it is safe to do so. Approaching motorists must be given enough time to come safely to a stop before a pedestrian steps off the pavement. Pedestrians must not run in front of vehicles making drivers brake suddenly and, perhaps by doing so cause an accident.

On the other hand, drivers are required to approach pedestrian crossing with caution, on the look-out for pedestrians. They should be courteous and, when safe to do so, stop to allow pedestrians to cross.

Vehicles should never overtake when approaching a crossing.♦

## Getting to know you: Minister Amathila finds a place in the hearts of Oranjemund women

Neither educational qualifications nor high government office have made Minister of Local Government and Housing Dr Libertine Amathila unapproachable. Her down-to-earth, practical and forthright approach endeared her to the more than sixty women who gathered, at her request, to meet her last Thursday.

Her simple message to women is: look after yourselves. A champion against traditional and discriminatory laws that oppress women, she opposes systems that protect men from shouldering their familial duties. She urged women to learn what their rights are and outlined her proposals to do away with unjust marriage, divorce and tax laws.

A cheque for R1000 raised jointly by the Christian Women of Oranjemund and Annabelles was presented to the Minister who plans to use it for a project to assist street children.

Minister Amathila was also given a skirt sewn by the Christian Women and a traditional baby sling made of material in the colours of the Namibian flag. It symbolises the Minister's responsibility of carrying the women of Namibia next to her body, near her heart. ♦

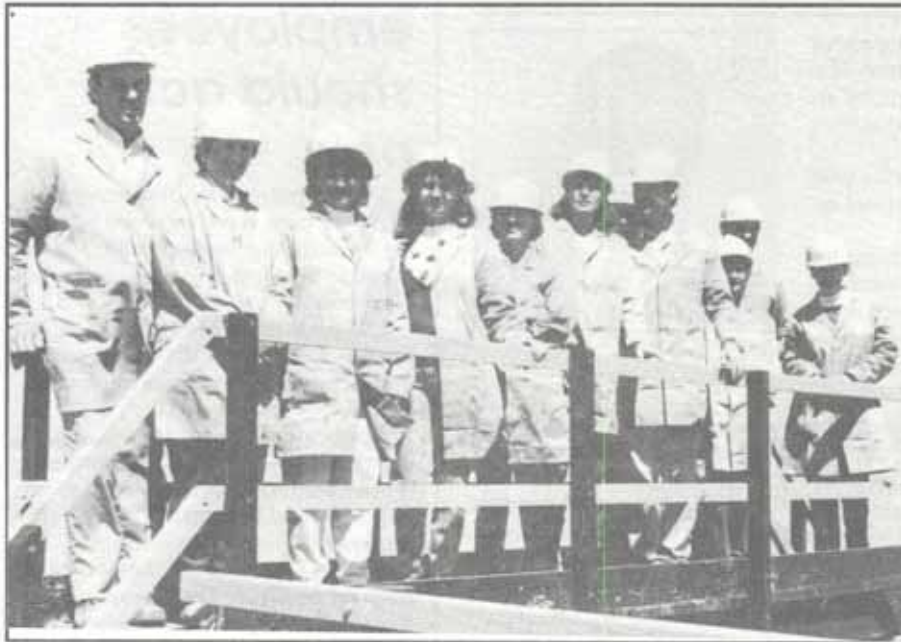

## Number plates - The hard and fast rule

Owners of vehicles displaying numberplates which do not conform to legal requirements may find themselves getting a traffic fine" warns Traffic Officer Bosman.

Numberplates on privately owned vehicles are required to have a yellow reflective background with black letters. The letters must be 75 mm high and 10 mm wide and all markings must be printed upright on the numberplate. Decorative numberplates and numberplates with slogans bearing the owner's name are illegal.

It is also illegal to display an SC number on the windscreen, whilst the numberplates read N ... OR. Only vehicles registered on or after September 1, 1990 can display the new registration. All other vehicles will, on renewal of the vehicle licence for 1991, be changed to the new Namibia registration number.

All vehicles registered in Namibia will be required to display the new numbers by March 7, 1992.

Owners of vehicles are reminded that vehicle licences must be renewed for the 1991 year period from January 2 to March 7 1991. ♦

### Where's Dirkie?

**T**his week it was rather a case of where's the boss? than who's the boss? for us girls at PR as concern for Dave Fanshawe's safety mounted along with unreturned telephone call slips on his desk.

Organiser of Exco's fishing sortie to Meob Bay, Dave earned himself a new nickname, Tracker Fanshawe as he gamely ran ahead of the 4 x 4 vehicles transversing the dunes. As he navigated the desert wastes - as only a seasoned seaman knows how - he had to admit that 'a few dunes had been moved since I was last there'.

The outward bound party which left Oranjemund last Friday at 05:00, arrived in Meob only 24 hours late. A too soon turn towards the coast saw the intrepid voyagers become roadbuilders. Their vehicle had to be man - and one woman - handled over the rocky seashore which could only be traversed at low-water mark.

Whilst fishing, another landmark to rival the bulldozer at the Ori-Hauchab was nearly added to the terrain when a Meob Land Rover came close to a thixotropic end.

Eager anglers had hardly enough time to snare a few steenbras - here Tracker again excelled by catching

A search by helicopter proved unnecessary as the dune busters led by Tracker sailed into Lüderitz on Tuesday evening - much to everyone's relief.

With or without Dirkie, this expedition is being favourably regarded as a viable alternative to the Lesotho Outward Bound school which sorts the men from the mice. ♦

It must be understood that the surgeon cannot visit private houses and that all appointments are handled at the Animal Clinic situated at the rear of the Hospital (North Wing).

### Vaccinations

**Rabies:** The minimum age for this vaccination is sixteen weeks. It is only valid for three years (if given over 12 months of age).

**Galaxy Vaccine 5-in-1:** Against distemper and cat flu. Dogs under 12 months must have a booster after 1 year. The minimum age for this vaccination is ten to eleven weeks. A booster should be given after 9 months and again after 1 year.

**Quadroid 4-in-1:** against cat flu, feline enteritis, snuffles: Minimum age for full dose - 4 months, valid for 1 year.

**Spays:** The minimum age at which this operation may be performed is 5 months. This can be done while the animal is in season although the operation is more complicated. Cats and dogs can be spayed when already pregnant.

**Most important:** Animals which require operations should have no food after the previous evening's meal.

### Removal of stitches

Stitches will be removed only on December 8. Nursing assistants will be in attendance from 14:00-16:30 (tel 2280).
