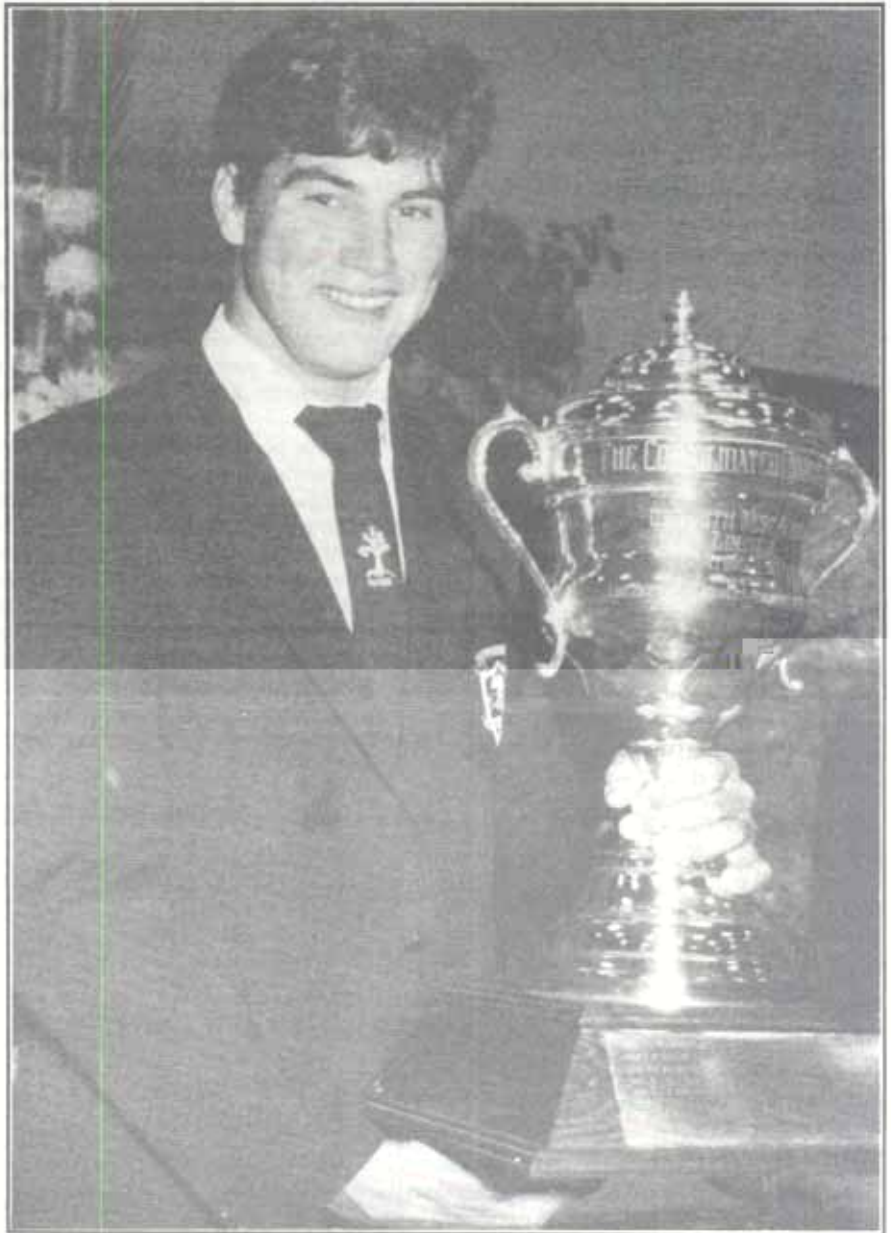
As Best Second Year Apprentice he will represent CDM at the De Beers Diamond Division Apprentice of the Year competition.

Tomorrow is World Aids Day: Women and Aids

"Women are the key to achieving health for all" *Hiroshi Nakajima, MD, PhD, Director General of the World Health Organisation.*

World Aids Day is part of the global effort to meet the challenge of AIDS - an epidemic that continues to worsen in all regions of the world.

In 1990 the message of World AIDS Day will reach more people than ever before, encouraging them to continue meeting the challenge of AIDS. The first AIDS Day in 1988 began this process by emphasising communication about AIDS. The second World AIDS Day in 1989 focused on the importance of youth in the AIDS epidemic. This year, World AIDS Day will focus on women.

Why Women?

AIDS should be a primary concern for women. By September 30, 1990 505 people were diagnosed as suffering from AIDS in Namibia. The number of HIV positive cases reported so far this year is 316. Sixty-two cases occurred in September alone; of these, thirty-two were women.

It can be seen that AIDS has a profound impact on women, both as an illness and as a social and economic challenge. Women play a crucial role in preventing infection as well as caring for HIV infected people and people with AIDS.

In order to help prevent the disaster AIDS could become, women will have, not only to practice responsible health behaviour themselves, but also be instrumental in teaching it to others. This will include practising safer sex, educating the family, helping to educate the community and becoming involved in community projects.

Active Sex Roles

Traditionally a women's role in sexual relationships has been that of the passive participant. The woman is often expected to be the recipient and not to make suggestions or take decisions. In the past, active women have often been regarded as "cheap" or "easy". (All this has changed somewhat since the advent of the women's movement.)

Liberated women now have to learn to persuade men to enjoy safer sex and thus play a different role. This implies that women should have a very clear idea about their own needs and wants, as well as the confidence to discuss this with a sex partner. It also implies that a woman should not drink too much or use drugs before having sex, as this may lead to her having less control over herself or her actions.

Talking about sex

We all still carry a legacy from the Victorian era when sex was indulged in, but never discussed. Any mention of sex would stun mixed audiences into embarrassed silence. This tendency is still very obvious in cinemas when sex scenes provoke a flutter of coughs and uncomfortable giggles from the audience. Psychologists and doctors have for some time advocate open communication between social participants to prevent the development of sexual and other problems.

Parents play a large role in shaping their child's perceptions and attitudes. If embarrassment is the reaction which greets any questions concerning sex, then the child will soon learn to associate sex with secretiveness and shame. Parents are in the position to help their children form a healthy attitude towards sex and procreation and the discussing thereof.

Sexual partners should also be able to discuss sex openly with each other. Such communication may help, not only to

prevent an unwanted pregnancy, but might also lower the risk of contracting AIDS or any other sexually transmitted disease. AIDS has made it more necessary than ever for sexual partners to take responsibility for their activities and talk openly before they embark on sexual intercourse. Women and men will have to learn the language of negotiation in sexual relationships. Condoms will have to be discussed. Every person sexually active outside of an exclusive one-to-one relationship, will have to carry condoms so as to be prepared in case their partners are not. Using condoms has ceased to be the trademark of immoderate or promiscuous sex. It has now become the symbol of responsibility and safety.

Apart from talking to family and lovers, it is also every woman's responsibility to help promote a safe environment by talking to colleagues, home helpers and friends. ♦

Parcel checks re-introduced at Shopping Centre

Because of soaring stock losses at the Shopping Centre parcel scrutinising will be re-introduced from today.

Also known in the trade as shrinkage, these losses pose the biggest risk to the successful operation of a viable retail establishment.

Losses can occur in three ways

- **Shoplifting:** Shoppers take merchandise without paying for it.
- **Till sweethearting:** Normally in collusion with a till operator, items are short rung or not rung up at all.
- **Underringing:** Till operators short ring merchandise.

What this means is that the customer eventually bears the burden both in financial terms and in inconvenience.

In the past the mine has borne these losses which, regrettably, are increasing. To counter this trend it has been decided to conduct searches of parcels entering and leaving the premises. Your co-operation in making this process as painless as possible would be appreciated.

"Any inconveniences is regretted, but we believe the customer will reap the benefits in the medium and longer term", says Shopping Centre manager Danie Erasmus.
