GOING SOMEWHERE? MEET THE MEN WHO'LL GET YOU THERE

EVERYONE or every aspect of Oranjemund life is at some time or in some way effected by the all pervasive activities of the Town Transport Services. Whether you use Company provided transport to get to your work station, you eat bread or you play golf then, somehow, TTS has been involved.

Town Transport Services, under the co-ordinator Hennie Mouton is seen by most people to solely provide buses and drivers for the various bus routes. It is true that the three routes, the Shift, Township and George Square runs provide extensive services to get employees to their work stations on the mine, in town, at the Central Kitchen, Mine Store, golf course, at Swartkops, Dunvley Gate and Beauvallon and back again after work. However, these scheduled routes are but a portion of TTS's involvement in community life.

For instance, how well known is it that Hennie's right-hand man, Israel Kalenga, the transport controller provides a taxi service after 17h00 to cater for those employees who have to work unplanned overtime? Or that a shift bus is run at 22h30 for the men who work shifts? Or that Oranjemund Hospital out-patients are taken to Kleinzee Hospital for specialist treatment and brought back the same day?

Fresh water and fuel

TTS permeates the very fabric of CDM's activities. Its water tankers, which hold either 16 000 litres or 8 000 litres, deliver fresh water to Chameis, Bakers Bay, Bogenfels and Black Rock as and when required. A bowser supplies fuel to points at Beauvallon Farm, Chameis, Bakers Bay, Jowell's Filling Station, Kolmanskop, Daberas and various places in Oranjemund including to the bakery, to run the oven.

Airways personnel, pilots and ground staff are transported to and from Alexander Bay airport via the guesthouse, travel agency and Recreation Club. The TTS are also responsible for delivering (and collecting) air mail to the airport to meet Cape Town, Windhoek and Johannesburg flights. A special bus meets scholars off flights from Cape Town and Windhoek at the end of each school term and ferries them back to Alexander Bay airport for the start of a new term. Children attending Gibeon Ame Private School are separately catered for by Israel's department.

Recruits and employees

Another trip to the airport meets new recruits and employees returning from leave via the popular means of travel, the bus via



Israel Kalenga.

Lüderitz is provided for men going on leave who have a good deal more luggage than they would be permitted to take on an aircraft.

A truck delivers mail and collects it, plus food and goods, from Lüderitz.

The Public Relations department uses TTS's excellent service to convey excursionists on the popular monthly Lüderitz tour. The department is also

responsible for maintaining the combis used by Public Relations and the general manager to transport VIP visitors.

As much as 70% of the work undertaken by TTS is unscheduled. Israel relies on people who require transportation contacting him in good time to book a vehicle. In the past OPS sports teams, the Scouts, the Pre-primary School, Ellland Crèche, the Voortrekkers and numerous other groups, clubs and organisations have called upon his services for their assistance.

CDM vehicles carry the "Appies" to write their trade test examinations in Windhoek; employees to attend outside courses in Namibia or the Republic of South Africa or to perform company duties at Bakers Bay, Bogenfels or Elizabeth Bay.

To drive the vast array of vehicles run by TTS, from the 59-seater Mercedes busses to the 4x4 LDVs and from the seven-ton trucks to the 26 000 litre water tankers TTS has, at any one time, 22 drivers. An assistant controller, Matheus Auala and two despatchers, Immanuel Fillemmon and Sylvester Gabriel to co-ordinate all the activities of this department.

When Newsletter staff went to TTS to interview Israel they found him busy analysing a survey he had conducted to try to improve the bus service to checkpoint each morning. He is endeavouring to provide a controlled arrival of staff at the Personnel Control Centre so that long queues are obviated.

Israel joined CDM in 1973. He had previously worked for a British company conducting mineral exploration for copper in Namibia. His first post was with Manning as a clerk before he transferred to Adult Education where he enjoyed teaching English. Another move took him to Data Processing, first as a punch operator then as a computer operator. He resigned to return to Adult Education where he stayed for four years teaching standard 8 English and mathematics. Only in 1984 did Israel apply and gain the position of assistant transport controller which came about through the reorganisation of the Transport section. Promotion took him to the position he holds today. One, he says, he finds particularly satisfying as he meets a lot of people from all walks of life every day.

Certainly this department has many satisfied customers who have safely travelled millions of kilometres driven by their excellent staff.

CDM'S biggest ever contingent, 53 athletes travel to Windhoek this weekend for the eighth Chamber of Mines athletic meeting.

WHERE HAS ALL THE WATER GONE?

For costume choice you could be an Egyptian slave girl; a sixties pop fan; a knight in chain armour; a bride or saloon girl from 1880 or you could wear a 1900's combination or knickerbocker suit.

This book is for all who are interested in fashion. Ideas are plentiful, The illustrations by Victor Ambrus are abundant and meticulous in detail.
